St. Paul 's Letter

MAY 2011

From the Pastor's Desk:

Dear St. Paul's Brothers and Sisters:

He is Risen, Indeed, Alleluia!! It's the resurrection season. And, boy, can we sure use some good news of new life. So much bad news swirls around: gangs in schools or gas prices/oil company profits or grocery store bills or grave weather or grief or _____ (fill in the blank with what is troubling you). In the midst of these seemingly en-tombing, even numbing, difficulties, we Christians have boldly entered into the Great 50 Days of Easter. Hearing and speaking over and over again about our Triune God's triumph over sin, death/the grave, evil, the devil and all the "powers of this world that rebel against God." We don't fully understand it, but we boldly proclaim it: Christ is Risen, Indeed! And we sing (not just in Easter Season) that "heaven and earth are full of Your glory."

Heaven and earth - all of creation, even if it is groaning in labor pains, is given new life in Christ. This is both exhilarating and mysterious!

The Easter proclamation is that God loves God's creation, and especially the firstborn of God's new creation (Col. 1:18; Rev.1:5), enough to redeem it, all of it, rather than lifting his Son out of it and setting him above it. Jesu Christ, in his resurrection brings all of creation along with him into the resurrection, for what he has assumed, he has redeemed. Jesus Christ assumed human flesh. As we now know, human flesh is composed of many different elements. All elements heavier than oxygen (like heavy metals) can only be formed in supernovae. Elements lighter than oxygen are found in stars like our sun, which means we are composed of elements found in local stars, but the heavier elements could only have come from stellar explosions. No wonder all of creation sings "Holy, holy, holy" at the eucharist. In Jesus Christ, not only humanity, but all of creation, is redeemed and caught up into divinity (Rom. 8:23). ... Resurrection is therefore not simply a spiritual reality... Resurrection means the raising of the dead. God did not simply take on the semblance of human form at the incarnation. Through Christ's death and resurrection, God overcame and transcended death in the body and extends the promise of participation in that resurrection to all those who call on God's name.

In this resurrection season, we will offer many reminders of God's ever-present hope and gift of new life: supporting our seminarian Jeanine as she goes forward toward ordination to chaplaincy ministry; partying together at the Cabaret; joining together to provide a delicious meal to our Sunday afternoon guests; celebrating with Julie as we prepare for her long-awaited ordination; welcoming New Members; deciding whether we can stretch out in faith to physically welcome all persons into worship; recognizing our youth in their final and intermediate faith stepping stones; and, gloriously, hearing the hope proclaimed in the beautiful Fauré *Requiem* - connecting us, through music, to all of creation's celebration!

So they left the tomb quickly with fear and great joy, and ran to tell his disciples.

-- Matthew 28:8

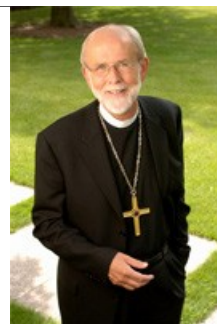
Mary Magdalene and Mary walked to Jesus' grave, expecting to find death. It's understandable. Images of violence filled their minds. Thoughts of their vulnerability and mortality deadened their spirits. Death had become the defining story of their lives.

Instead of death, the women met a resurrection messenger who said, "He is not here: for he has been raised, as he said." As they hurried to tell others, the risen Jesus met them. They were changed. Now resurrection, not death, would define their lives.

Jesus lives! Now resurrection, not death, defines our lives. Jesus continues to meet you in resurrection messengers, just as Jesus met me in Pastor Josephus Livenson Lauvanus, president of the Lutheran Church of Haiti. As we walked through the ruins and rubble that lie in the aftermath of Haiti's earthquake, Pastor Lauvanus proclaimed, "We will not be defined by rubble, but by restoration, for we are a people of the resurrection."

Baptized into Jesus' death and raised to newness of life we, too, are people of the resurrection. We, too, are resurrection messengers. We, too, are about God's work of restoration.

The world aches to hear the message we have to tell. Sing with joy! Jesus lives! We are a people of the resurrection.



FROM THE CHURCH COUNCIL PRESIDENT'S DESK:

As we complete the reflective season of Lent and embody the energy of the Easter Season proclaiming “Christ is risen, He is risen indeed, Alleluia”, we’ve come into a season of physical growth. We witness it in the growth of vegetation and in the growth of members of our congregation: one recently baptized, some preparing for confirmation and some preparing for high school graduation. As a community, we are blessed to have such events and it feels good to share in the celebration of our younger members’ milestones by congratulating them and encouraging them to boldly continue their journey.

As a congregation, we are on a journey and continue our growth together. In last month’s newsletter, the Council listed some of the important goals they intended to prioritize with your assistance. The process is nearly complete and we look forward to sharing it with you soon.

What I can tell you now is that we are excited about the plantings, welcoming new members, the new member breakfast, the Cabaret, the Synod Assembly, the Fauré Requiem, the Retirement Research Foundation grant submission, the Church website redesign, the baptism, the affirmations/confirmations, and a wedding planned for later this year. All signs of growth.

We are looking at ways to continue to offer our home as a place for groups to come together in ways we feel are important. The accessibility issue continues to be a focus and the Retirement Research Foundation grant possibility allows us to begin moving forward to discussing steps needed to make this physical structure inviting. Specifically, the Church is submitting ideas to make St. Paul’s more accessible. Should we be fortunate enough to win an award, the Foundation will match us dollar for dollar up to \$30,000 in our various projects. In fact, the competition requires that we have a plan to come up with the funds in 18 months of being awarded funds from the Foundation. This match allows our Church to “have one dollar be two dollars” – sounds a bit like the fishes and loaves story. We plan to hold a congregational meeting after Sunday worship on May 15th to discuss the details and answer all questions. This, too, is a sign of growth.

That’s a growth story. Let us thank the Lord and pray that we continue to explore ways to grow with Christ together.

"But God, who is rich in mercy, out of the great love with which he loved us even when we were dead through our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ Jesus— by grace you have been saved — and raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, so that in the ages to come he might show the immeasurable riches of his grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus" (Ephesians 2:4-7).

It was that time of year: the beginning of Epiphany and the end of Christmas lights and trees, a time when the home must be begrudgingly de-decorated. Fortunately, we had a live sound track for our duties: our singing daughter, Evelyn.

As we wrapped ornaments and returned them to their tins, Evelyn skipped around the house singing holiday songs, 3-year-old style. At one point, she burst into the refrain of her favorite carol, "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing!" With complete confidence, she sang: "Peace on earth and mercy wild, God and sinners reconciled."

Now, to be honest, my gut reaction was to correct her: "Mercy mild, Evie." But I resisted. In fact, I decided I liked the idea of wild mercy and that Evelyn's version is really the right one.

God is rich in mercy, and that mercy is wildly wonderful. Mercy isn't tame or calm. It doesn't follow our rules. Mercy works in unexpected ways, and it's not always comfortable. Mercy takes us sinners, young and old, and says, "You are forgiven! You are loved, and grace is all around you!" Wild.

Now it's early spring and the time is coming when my husband and I will fill baskets with colored eggs and our children will learn Easter songs of faith. But we also might want to bring back Evelyn's Christmas refrain, for Easter is not about a mild occurrence. Easter is about the uncontainable mercy of God, who raises Jesus from the dead!

How wild is that?

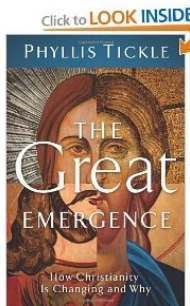
